# Teaching aids:

2 backing tracks: 1) Music Quiz with movement : 2) Body Percussion and Voice with music

## Focus of Lesson

- Geography
- Cultural
- Instrument and genre recognition
- Body percussion, rhythm, pulse, tempo.
- Leadership

# Curriculum goals:

- Appreciate and understand a wide range of high quality live and recorded music drawn from different traditions and from great composers and musicians
- Develop an understanding of the history of music
- Listen with attention to detail and recall sounds with increasing aural memory

# Learning Outcomes:

- Appreciation of different music genres
- Appreciation of music from different cultures
- Understand how your body works in a musical context
- Understand how imitation and repetition are fundamental to music
- Understanding the importance of pulse to pull together musical sounds



## Key Vocabulary:

Genre: A specific type of music or film

Pulse: A regular beat

### **Rhythm:**

A strong repeated pattern of movement and sound - on top of the pulse

### Tempo:

The speed or given pace of a piece

### Pitching:

Set one's voice or a piece of music at a particular pitch

### Konnokal

Is the art of performing percussion syllables vocally in South Indian music





## Music quiz and movement Journey to four continents

#### **Backing track 1**

- Ask the students to listen to the pulse/beat/rhythm and move/dance to the music, looking out for tempo (speed) and mood.
- Can the Students guess which continent/Country the music originates from?

#### See the pictures of Instruments used in the music for reference

- 1. West Africa (Ghana) Instruments used: Talking Drum, Kplango drum, Caxixi Shakers
- 2. Middle East (Egypt) Instruments used: Oud Arabic Lute (Video 0.37)
- 3. South America (Brazil) Instruments used: agogo bell Conga drums, Brazilian Cavaquinho (small Brazilian guitar) (Video 1.25)
- 4. Asia (China) Instruments used: Guzheng Chinese plucked Zither strings (Video 2.20)
- 5. Asia (India) Instruments used: Dhol Drum double sided barrel drum Tabla pair of twin drums. (Video 3.37)

# Music from around the world: Body Rhythm and Voice

#### Learn the different rhythms for each country from backing track 2

- Ghanian Rhythm Kplango FEEL THE RHYTHM IN YOUR HANDS AND FEET 1.
- 2. Middle Eastern Rhythm - Maqsum - DUM TAK - TAK DUM TAK
- South America Rhythm Clave 3/2 COME AND DANCE WITH ME 3.
- 4. Chinese Rhythm - ONE (REST) THREE FOUR
- Indian Rhythm Konnakol TAKA DIMI TAKA JUNA 5.
- Ask the students to experiment, choosing what sounds they are going to use for the rhythms.
- Body percussion sounds they could use: CLAP, STOMP, CHEST, THIGHS, CHEEKS, CLICK.
- Practice with instruction backing track 2, with students playing the rhythms on their bodies whilst saying them out loud.
- Play backing track 1 without the instructions and see if you can remember the rhythms. The teacher leads first, then ask the students to lead - take it in turns.
