

Make your own





Victorian picture frames could sometimes be as ornate as the beautiful artworks they surround, Just like this artwork from the De Morgan Collection at Cannon Hall

You will need:

An A4 piece of thickish card, it could be used from packaging too
Tin Foil
String
A glue stick or PVA
Scissors
An A4 piece of paper
A teaspoon
Yellow and orange felt tips
Scissors



Fold the A4 paper in half, draw round it in the middle of your card and carefully cut out to create a basic frame.



Glue on strip of the frame and add your string embellishment. The Victorians liked decorative frames, so curl and curve your string to the card. You can add shapes from the offcuts of card.



Continue this around all of the frame, remember to leave gaps in between the shapes so the foil can stick later.



Cut a strip of foil, slightly bigger than the top of the frame. Add some more glue to the frame and stick on the foil. Wrap the foil around the back and stick and use the back of the spoon to bring out the edges of the shapes.



Continue this all the way around. You can add some colour details using the felt tips too. The felt tips take a long time to dry and may smudge, so its best to not colour the whole frame in.



To finish the frame off, you could draw a Victorian portrait onto a brown envelope and stick on the back.



3. Take the head of the snake bookmark and Fold over the top your snake towards you making a fold on the fold line to make the shape of the snake head.




4. Find your favourite book and add in your book mark. Make sure the head is hanging over the front of the book and the body is inside the book.

Pressed Flower Picture

The beautiful flower gardens at Cannon Hall have inspired this picture. What Picture can you make with flowers from

your garden?

You will need:

An A4 piece of paper or thin card
A pen or pencil
Paper or plastic straws
(or paper rolled into long thin tubes)
Sticky tape
String or wool




Check with your grown up and pick some flowers from the garden. Don't pick wild flowers as the may be poisonous and are also protected by law.

Place in kitchen paper and cover. with card.

Ask a grown up to press them for you with an iron. Be careful as irons are very hot.



Now we will make a kind of flower sandwich. First place one frame face down and cover with clingflim. Glue the film to the card. Then arrange your flowers and secure with glue.



Cut 8 strips of card 5cm wide and 25 cm long to make the window frame.

Glued the overlapped corners. You should have 2 frames that look like this.



Paint the fronts of both frames white or any colour you like.



I decided to make a vase from a piece of stripy paper, save this for last. Cover the flowers with another piece of clingfilm and your second frame.

Finally glue the second frame in place and then add the vase.

You will need:

Carboard tube Card paper or googly eyes glue scissors colours- we've used paint but collage, crayons or felts would all work well



Colour in your cardboard tube. We've used paint but collage or felt tips would also work



Cut out legs, tail and head out of card. Use the cardboard tube to work oout how big you need to make them.



Cut a horizonal slot about 1cm long where you want your legs, head and tail to go in both your tube and your card pieces



Slot all your pieces into place

Wilk Carton Monster

Make your own



Over 100 years ago a girl called Winifred lived at Cannon Hall and spent her time drawing monsters. Can you make your own Cannon Hall Monster with a milk carton?

You will need:

An empty and clean 4 pint plastic
milk bottle (no lid)
Bright
acrylic paint and paint brush
Cardboard
Glue
Scissors
Pipe Cleaners
Sellotape
Stickersto decorate



At the opposite side of the handle, draw a large mouth with teeth and start to cut out.



Add your monster's hair. Pipe cleaners twirled like this work well or straws or even twigs.



Choose a bright colour of paint and paint the outside of the milk carton.



Cut out cardboard feet and eyes to stick on.



Decorate your monster with stickers or painted patterns.



Why not make your monster a friend?



Lord it up like the Georgians with your own, very posh, playing card notebook.

Without TV or the internet the Georgians were great at finding other entertainment, from playing cards, parties and writing letters to each other to plan more get-togethers and the Stanhopes of Cannon Hall were no exception! Why not make your own notebook inspired by Cannon Hall's heyday?

You will need:

2 x playing cards
Scissors
Glue
Electrical tape (or Sellotape)
I x sheet of A4 paper
A piece of ribbon (not essential)



 Fold and cut your paper to the width of one of the playing cards.
 Cut the paper in half along the fold.



4. Take one of the playing cards and stick it to the front of the book, stick the second on the back to make a front and back cover.



2. Using the card again, fold one of the strips of paper back and forth to make a concertina.

Repeat on the other strip of paper



5. Stick a strip of tape on one side of the book to bind it together. Leave half unstuck so that you can fold it over the other side of the book, onto the back.



3. Glue the back page of one of the Concertina's and stick it the back page of the second to make an extra long concertina book.



6. You can finish off your book with a loop of ribbon, stuck down with tape on the back and it's ready for you to write or draw in.



Woulf own Bug Tower

A cardboard tube
Paints/colours/stickers or what

work.)

Ask your grown up to help you cut out a door and windows in your cardboard tube.



Paint or colour your tube



Stick your gauze fabric on your roof and in your windows.



Decorate your bug tower



Attach your paper fasteners for a door knob, and tie closed with string or wool. Buttons could be used instead.
